Crash Information


- Two young women were struck by a Mazda 3 at the intersection of King Edward Avenue & Somerset Street East
 - One woman died from her injuries in the hospital, the other suffered serious injuries and survived
- Crash occurred at 5:38am on October 18, 2022
 - A crash report was requested by our nominator through a freedom of information form
 - Request was denied; report contains personal information and our nominator's name is not listed as a party in the report
- Ottawa Open Data indicates it was wet and dark in Ottawa that morning

Crash Information

 Cleber Figueiredo documented the King Edward Avenue speed limit is posted at 40km/h (about 25 mph)

 Motorist was traveling in the northbound lane on King Edward Avenue

 Media coverage leads us to believe the pedestrians were in the crosswalk along King Edward Avenue



Crash Information


 A paramedic coming off night shift was first on the scene, other units followed

 Both pedestrians were transported to the Ottawa Hospital's Civic Campus trauma unit after the collision

 Police said investigators wanted to speak with anyone who witnessed the collision or had further information


Overall Site Conditions


- King Edward Avenue has a speed limit of 40km/h (~25mph)
- The crash location segment of King Edward Avenue consists of sidewalks on either side, a through traffic lane in each direction (north & south), and a center lane for left-hand turns
- Streetlights appear to be placed evenly apart on the southbound side of King Edward
- Traffic signals appear to be back plated



Overall Site Conditions


- Auto-oriented urban development pattern
 - Crash Location is north of Trans-Canada Highway (417) and Mann Avenue (64)
 - King Edward is reportedly used as an alternative to highway travel
- Proximity to University of Ottawa
 - Over 44,000 attending students with multiple university buildings nearby the crash location
- Mixed residential and commercial uses
- Area is frequented by travelers crossing to Quebec






Collision Location & Memorial

Approaching Intersection






NB Motorist Entering Intersection

Sidewalk to Sidewalk – ~52'


From Planting Strip to Planting Strip – 83'


 Preliminary Speed Study indicates significant number of automobiles traveling at fatal speeds
